### Introduction



During the 26th Regular Meeting of the Commission, which was held from 18-25 November 2019, in Palma de Mallorca, Mallorca, Spain, ICCAT adopted a new multiannual conservation and management programme for tropical tunas. In addition, the Commission finalized the protocol to amend the International Convention for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas, which had been developed over the past six years. The new text modernizes the Commission and provides а mandate to manage oceanic sharks and ray.

In 2019, full scientific stock assessments were carried out for two species: yellowfin tuna (*Thunnus albacares*) and white marlin (*Tetrapturus albidus*), while new projections were provided for shortfin mako shark (*Isurus oxyrinchus*). The following list of adopted recommendations will enter into force on 20 June 2020:

### **OTHER ACTIVITIES**

In November 2019, with the collaboration of the Namibian authorities, JCAP financed and developed a training course on capacity building in Namibia to improve data collection and reporting on tuna fisheries, to complete and report Task 1 and Task 2 datasets to ICCAT and to recover historical datasets on tuna and tuna-like species. Unfortunately, despite all the efforts by the Secretariat to organize a similar training course in Angola, this capacity building initiative has not yet been scheduled due to logistical issues faced by the local authorities related to ongoing internal changes at the Directorate of National Fisheries. The new five-year ICCAT-JAPAN Capacity-building Assistance Project (JCAP-2), which started in December 2020, includes a new work package, aiming to *enhance scientific capacity building through Masters degrees and/or long-term training in research laboratories.* The ongoing data collection programme in Liberia has been financed through JCAP-2, and funding for 2020 has been approved.

#### **ONGOING RESEARCH AND DATA COLLECTION PROGRAMMES**

After successful completion in September 2019 of Phase 8 of the Atlantic-Wide Research Programme for **Bluefin Tuna (GBYP)**, the next two phases of the Programme i.e. Phases 9 and 10, have been initiated, and are being implemented in parallel over the first months of 2020. Phase 9, with a total budget of  $\notin$  1,750,000, started on 1 January 2019 and is scheduled to end on 30 April 2020, following a four-month extension. It has focused on different lines of research, such as tagging trials, development and methodological improvement of aerial surveys, collection of biological samples, microchemical and genetic analyses, ageing and implementation of a broad study on BFT growth on farms in five areas, as well as on further advances in implementation of the BFT Management Strategies Evaluation. Phase 10, which started on 1 January 2020, will run for a year, and is a logical continuation of the activities initiated in the previous phases, but will increasingly focus on improving coordination between GBYP activities and the many monitoring and research activities carried out on BFT by other institutions, both at national and international level, such as ichthyoplankton studies and tagging trials, as well as on the design and development of broad relational databases to integrate the huge amount of data generated in previous GBYP phases, such as those from biological samples analyses, aerial surveys, electronic tags or stereo-cameras measurements. In addition, a novel non-invasive method for monitoring BFT growth in farms which combines acoustic and imaging techniques will be tested shortly, and the feasibility will be explored of implementing a close-kin markrecapture study for the eastern stock of Atlantic bluefin tuna, and of using acoustic techniques for developing BFT abundance indices. Phase 10 has a total budget of €2,000,000.

The *Atlantic Ocean Tropical tuna Tagging Programme (AOTTP)* recently began tagging tuna around an oceanographic observation buoy 600 nautical miles north of the Brazilian coast. The overall target to tag 120,000 fish across the tropical Atlantic will be reached very soon. To date nearly 17,000 tagged fish have been recovered with metadata. AOTTP Coordination is now organising the Final Symposium which will take place in Dakar, Senegal, in June 2020. The project has also recently been evaluated by independent consultants and their recommendations will be published during the first quarter 2020.

*Small Tunas Year Programme (SMTYP)* continued developing biological studies on key population parameters for selected small tuna species, which are essential for carrying out stock assessments in the near future. These studies have been conducted by a new cooperative and coordinated consortium composed of teams from CPCs from North and western Africa, South America and South West Europe.

**Enhanced Programme for Billfish Research (EPBR)** has expanded its activities, and is developing biological studies on key population parameters for the three major billfish species (blue and white marlins and sailfish) in the eastern Atlantic. This work, which is being carried out by a Consortium of western African countries, is essential to improve billfish stock assessments.

*Shark Research and Data Collection Programme (SRDCP)* has focused its activities on four major themes: age and growth study; population genetics; stock boundaries, migrations and habitat use; and, post-release mortality on pelagic longline fisheries. This year the focus of the ongoing studies has now been extended to porbeagle and other shark species currently subject to a prohibition on retention in ICCAT (i.e. threshers, silk, oceanic whitetip and hammerhead sharks).

## ASSISTANCE FUNDS FOR DEVELOPING STATES

In 2019, the Meeting Participation Fund for Developing ICCAT Contracting Parties (Rec. 14-14), financed the attendance of 105 delegates from 30 CPCs at ICCAT scientific and non-scientific meetings. The Commission has adopted new Rules of procedure for the administration of the special Meeting Participation Fund.

## PUBLICATIONS

Issue 8 of Volume 75 and Issues 1 to 11 of Volume 76 of the *Collective Volume of Scientific Papers*, including 179 scientific papers and reports presented to the SCRS during 2019, have been published.

## **Other activities**

Since September 2019 the Secretariat has received the following voluntary contributions:

- In December 2019, a one-year contract for €200,000 was signed with the European Union to continue improving the capacity of developing countries. It covers the activities of the *Recommendation by ICCAT Amending Recommendation 11-26 on the Establishment of a Meeting Participation Fund for Developing ICCAT Contracting Parties* (Rec. 14-14).
- In December 2019, a new one-year contract was signed with the European Union, to continue strengthening the scientific basis for decision-making in ICCAT. This contract, for a total amount of €1,075,550.00, includes a voluntary contribution from the European Union (€850,000.00) for ICCAT scientific activities.
- Also in December 2019, a contract was signed with the European Union to support the upcoming Intersessional Meeting of the Panel 1. This contract includes a voluntary contribution of €85,000.00 from the European Union.
- In February 2020, Chinese Taipei notified the Secretariat that it will provide a volutntary contribution of €111,000.00 for 2020 activities.
- The EU and the FAO Common Ocean/ABNJ Tuna Project co-funded the December 2019 joint-tRFMO Bycatch Working Group Meeting in the amounts of €200,000.00 and €40,000.00, respectively. These funds enabled the participation of 9 experts and 32 delegates from 18 countries.
