Dear Mr Tsamenyi,

I am writing in response to the Note Verbale that you sent on 02 February 2016 about catches of bluefin tuna taken in British Gibraltar Territorial Waters (BGTW).

The UK Government is clear that neither the provisions of the International Convention for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (the Convention) nor measures and rules established by the International Commission for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (ICCAT) apply to BGTW. Additionally, according to the relevant legal framework, we do not consider that HM Government of Gibraltar's actions constitute illegal, unreported, and unregulated activity (IUU). The UK Government and HM Government of Gibraltar are committed to the sustainable management of tuna and tuna-like species, and I hope that the additional information below is sufficient to reassure you of our position.

The Convention's provisions and ICCAT's quotas, measures and procedures do not apply to BGTW as neither the UK's nor the EU's ratification of ICCAT extends to the territory of Gibraltar. HM Government of Gibraltar has taken steps to voluntarily implement effective conservation and management of bluefin tuna in BGTW, and whilst these steps are in line with ICCAT standards, they are independent of ICCAT's formal remit.

The UK's ratification of the UN Convention on the Law of the Seas (UNCLOS) does extend to the territory of Gibraltar. We therefore consider it to be the applicable legal framework here. According to UNCLOS a coastal state (here, the United Kingdom) is free to set laws for the conservation and use of marine resources in its territorial seas. HM Government of

Gibraltar therefore is entitled to undertake the measures that they have, which they set out in detail in their letter of 19 April 2016.

Therefore, as the Convention obligations and ICCAT rules do not apply to BGTW, and given that HM Government of Gibraltar has a mandate to pursue conservation measures under UNCLOS, we do not consider HM Government of Gibraltar's activities to constitute IUU.

I hope that this information provides reassurance that HM Government of Gibraltar is acting in accordance with international law and in a way which ensures effective conservation and sustainable use of bluefin tuna.
